#### Academic Integrity (under construction)

How is Academic Integrity Defined at UC Berkeley?

There is no single agreed upon definition of academic integrity. However, most definitions found in the literature and across higher education institutions consider academic integrity to entail honesty, responsibility, and openness to both scholarship and scholarly activity.

The University defines academic misconduct as "any action or attempted action that may result in creating an unfair academic advantage for oneself or an unfair academic advantage or disadvantage for any other member or members of the academic community" (UC Berkeley Code of Student Conduct).

There is more detailed information related to this definition of academic integrity in the <u>Code of Student</u> <u>Conduct</u>.

#### The UC Berkeley Honor Code:

"As a member of the UC Berkeley community, I act with honesty, integrity, and respect for others."

#### Information For In-Class Instruction

Ways to encourage academic integrity:

- · Address academic integrity in your syllabus. Some adapted examples from Berkeley faculty.
- Minimizing academic dishonesty via thoughtful assignment design. Some adapted examples from Berkeley faculty.
- · Direct students to resources and guides provided by The Library for properly citing sources.
- Discuss with students some common contributing factors to academic dishonesty and ways to overcome them.
- · Help students learn how to best prepare for an exam.
- · Clarify the art of paraphrasing.

Procedures to follow when a breach in academic integrity is suspected:

- Start by following the <u>procedures outlined by the Center for Student Conduct</u> PROCESS REVISED!
- Faculty Disposition/Referral Form for Academic Misconduct




### PROFILE OF THE UNIVERSITY

- Relatively young university (since 2008)
- \* Three campuses: San Diego, Newport Beach, and La Jolla (CA)
- MBA, Bachelors in Business, Intensive English Program
- Around 150 students in each campus (50% MBA program, 20% bachelors, 30% English)
- Over the years: >97% international students
- Faculty-student ratio (average): 1:30
- Faculty MBA-BBA programs: 75% PT, 25% FT

# TEACHING FOREIGN STUDENTS U.S. ACADEMIC STANDARDS

#### INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS: CULTURAL ISSUES

### Foreign students bring unique challenges:

Different attitude toward intellectual property and ownership

In some cultures, copying another person's work is seen as a sign of respect. Repeating someone's words is considered part of tradition and is a way of passing information.

#### Group-oriented learning

Independent thinking is not encouraged Pressure to help the weaker learner to succeed (helping a friend is not cheating, but moral obligation).
